First Sunday of Advent

- One: The Psalmist writes in Psalm 122 verse 1

Instructions about Today's Service

The Meaning of the Service

Today we mark the beginning of a new year in the Christian calendar as we prepare to enter the season of Advent. It is a time for both self-reflection and for joy, as we prepare ourselves to receive God's promised Messiah. As someone once said, "Advent makes innkeepers of us all." And when the knock comes, we want there to be room in our hearts for the Christ Child to be born in us anew.

Our service today will help us take a fresh look at some of our cherished traditions, so that we might see the deeper meaning behind them. We begin our service with candles, symbolizing the True Light that is even now coming into the world. The light shines not only for us within the walls of this sanctuary, but also shines out into the world beyond.

Call to Worship

The Colors of Advent

In the light of God's love for us, ordinary colors take on particular significance. One color associated with Advent is purple, which signifies the sacred and a season of reflection. Here at Trinity, you will see that color not only in the Advent wreath, but also in the cloths that cover the communion table and the front of the pulpit

Some other churches use blue instead, for hope and anticipation.

If you look closely, you may notice that there is one pick candle in the Advent wreath. It is always lit on the third Sunday of Advent—a Sunday known as Joy Sunday. It tells us that our time of waiting is nearing its end.

The Christ Candle—the large white candle in the center of the wreath—is white, the color of holiness and purity. Here at Trinity, we use this same candle on the communion table the rest of the year. However, while the Light of Christ always shines, we do not light the Christ Candle in Advent until the night we celebrate Christ's birth.

The Evergreens of Christmas

The color green reminds us of renewal, new life, freshness, and rebirth. Evergreens never change—they are always green, always living. In ancient Rome, evergreens were symbols of peace, joy and victory. Early Christians adopted their use, placing boughs in their windows as a symbol of Christ, a reminder of the everlasting life that is ours through him.

Here at Trinity, our wreaths are emblems of eternity as well, since the circle has no beginning and no end, like God's love for us and for all God's creation.

While the Christmas tree likely has its beginnings in a number of countries with traditions of decorating trees with fruit, flowers, or small ornaments, legend says that Martin Luther was the first to place lights on an evergreen. Walking home through the woods one evening, he was struck by the beauty of the forest with the stars shining in the sky above. So he cut an evergreen with snowy boughs and brought it home to his wife and children. They placed small candles on the branches to represent the heavens above. The custom gradually spread throughout Europe and then on to America.

One of our own traditions at Trinity is to adorn our tree not only with lights but also with red bows. The red symbolizes the sacrificial love of our Lord and Savior, which calls us into a community of faith and a family within the family of God.

Decorating the Tree

As music plays, you are invited to come forward and place a red bow on the tree. The side wreaths will also be hung.
